Year 1 - Spring Term Curriculum Letter

Welcome back after the Christmas holidays! We hope that you have all had a lovely Christmas / New Year and are looking forward to lots of exciting learning over the course of Spring Term.

In <u>**R.E.</u>** the themes of learning are Families and Celebrations and Following Jesus. Through these we will learn about what it means to be part of a family and how we become a member of the church by receiving the Sacrament of Baptism. We will then go on to learn about Jesus and his disciples and the events leading up to his death on Good Friday. This will lead us in to our Easter celebrations.</u>

In <u>Mathematics</u> we will be continuing to learn our number bonds to 20 and how to use the four operations. We will continue counting in multiples of 2, 5 and 10 and will be looking at doubles and near doubles. We will also look at sequencing numbers to 50 and exploring different calculation strategies. At the end of half term we will move onto fractions and measure and length. Completing weekly homework and number formation with your child will really help us embed these skills.

In **English** we will be continuing to improve our sentence writing skills by practising and applying our phonics, using correct punctuation and experimenting with the use of conjunctions and adjectives. We will be writing stories, lists and diary entries to develop our 'Alan Peat' style sentences. Our novels in English will be linked to our History theme of Travel and Transport. This half term we are learning all about Simon Bartram's Man on the Moon by writing a diary entry of a day in the life of the main character Bob. We will be looking more about how to persuade the reader by making the moon the cleanest it could possibly be! Next half term we will be Claire Freedman's Aliens love underpants. For this book we will be generating our own ideas to create our own narrative about the silly antics aliens can get up to with their underpants.

At home, please encourage regular reading of fiction & non-fiction. Continue to promote the love for books and try to allow your child the opportunity to discuss the texts they've read. Through discussion at home, encourage them to develop their vocal expression in their written language, their understanding of the meaning of words and the effects they have. Remember - 'They have to be able to say it before they can write it.'

In <u>Science</u> we will be learning about animals, including humans. Through this, the children will have the chance to further develop their knowledge of what living things are, groups of animals and their diet, the human skeleton and body parts and which senses links to each part.

Our <u>History</u> theme this half term is Travel and Transport we will be learning about different modes of transport in the past and in the present. Having a big focus on the influential people of them such a s Neil Armstrong, The Wright Brothers and George Stephenson. We will also get the chance to make our own futuristic cars!

Next half term in <u>Geography</u> we will be learning about maps and Geography skills. We will begin to use positional language, identify human and physical features of an area, and use simple maps to follow directions. We will study aerial photographs of different areas and improve our observational skills by studying the school environment.

Physical Education (P.E.) - is on **Tuesday** and **Thursday**, children will continue to come to school already wearing their PE kits on these days.

The St. Paulinus P.E. kit consists of: a white t-shirt with or without the school logo, blue (or black) shorts, and a pair of pumps. As an optional extra, a dark coloured pair of jogging trousers and a school P.E. hoodie (with logo) can also be worn when we are outside / during the winter months.

In addition, the **only** jewellery permitted in school is a pair of plain small stud earrings. If your child has pierced ears, then they need to remove their earrings on each morning of P.E.

Please note that staff are not able to remove earrings, so this will result in your child not taking part in our P.E. lessons and an alternative task will be provided for the child, this is due to health and safety reasons.

- Long hair <u>must</u> be tied back.
- Please ensure your child wears their PE kit on their PE days. If your child does not come to school in their P.E. kit, you may receive a text message to inform you that they need it for the following week. All P.E. kit and School uniform must be labelled clearly with your child's name. If it becomes lost, it can then be easily returned to the rightful owner.

Homework– Homework and an additional piece of phonics work will be sent home every **Friday** evening. Homework is to be returned by the following <u>Wednesday</u> in order for children to be awarded Dojo points. The purpose of homework is to consolidate the learning from class and to prepare them for more intensive homework at high school. It is therefore extremely important that this work is completed.

<u>**Reading**</u> - Children will have a reading book which will be brought home on a daily basis and MUST be returned to school every day. We will change your child's book once a week. Please remember to write in your child's reading record to acknowledge that you have listened to your child read. It is also very important to check your child's understanding when reading. Finally, please remember to access <u>Bug Club</u>.
